- 4 Arvada was named after Hiram Arvada Haskins, Mary Ann Wadsworth's brother-in-law. The name refers to an island now know as Arwad off the coast of this country.
- 10 The Patrons of Husbandry No. 155 was part of this group, the oldest service organization in Wheat Ridge.
- 13 He was elected in 1904 as Arvada's first mayor.
- 14 This building was the site of Arvada's first school and first church service in 1863. It was burned down, rebuilt and eventually demolished in the late 1960s to make way for Interstate 70.
- 15 Son of the Wheat Ridge Cyclery owner, he competed in the Tour de France seven times and won a bronze medal in the 1984 Olympics.

- 1 This annual event that celebrates the City of Wheat Ridge and its residents marked its 38th year in August 2007.
- 2 This man, born in Scotland in 1838, is the namesake of the marble used to construct Arlington National Cemetery and the Colorado State Capitol. He discovered it in a Colorado creek.
- 3 In 1925, this group erected a flagpole at Grandview Avenue and Webster Street, raising it and lowering it each day.
- 5 In 1976, the Arvada Center for the Arts and Humanities debuted with this musical.
- 6 This Arvada event was first held on June 17, 1911, and was the precursor to the annual Harvest Festival.
- 7 In 1900, this man was the first graduate of Wheat Ridge High School.
- 8 Colorado's first documented one of these occurred in Arvada in 1850.
- 9 In 1941, Arvadans found the first one of these at Wadsworth Boulevard and Grandview Avenue.
- 11 This Arvada landmark served the community until 1975.
- 12 Arvada was once known as the "_____ Capital of the World."
